

Middle-Class Anxiety and Urban Alienation in Contemporary Indian English Novels: A Comparative Literary Analysis

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ABSTRACT

This study examines the representation of urban alienation and middle-class anxiety in the selected novels of Chetan Bhagat and Anita Desai. Rapid urbanization and globalization have transformed the socio-economic landscape of India, creating new opportunities alongside psychological challenges such as stress, identity crises, loneliness, and emotional isolation. Using a qualitative comparative approach, the study analyses Bhagat's *Five Point Someone* and *One Night @ the Call Center* alongside Desai's *Cry, the Peacock* and *Clear Light of Day*. Bhagat portrays the visible pressures of academic competition, corporate culture, and middle-class aspirations, whereas Desai explores the deeper psychological effects of loneliness, marital conflict, memory, and emotional neglect. Drawing upon theories of urban alienation, existentialism, and psychological criticism, the study demonstrates that both authors reveal the contradictions of urban middle-class life, where material progress often coexists with emotional insecurity. The findings highlight Indian English fiction as an important medium for understanding the psychological and social realities of contemporary urban India.

I. Introduction

Urbanization in India has significantly transformed the social, economic, and psychological landscape, creating a complex environment in which the middle class negotiates opportunity and pressure. Chetan Bhagat's novels, including *Five Point Someone*, *2 States*, and *Revolution 2020*, vividly capture the dilemmas of contemporary urban middle-class youth. His protagonists grapple with academic pressures, uncertain career paths, and familial expectations, reflecting culturally specific anxieties linked to aspirations for upward mobility (Bhagat 2004; 2009). Bhagat's narrative style is direct, accessible, and socially grounded, portraying middle-class challenges in a relatable manner that resonates with a broad readership (Sharma 78). Through the depiction of urban educational institutions, corporate spaces, and interpersonal relationships, he foregrounds the visible stresses of modern Indian life. Often employing humour, situational irony, and familiar social settings, Bhagat illustrates the tension between individual desire and societal norms, offering a compelling insight into the aspirations, vulnerabilities, and anxieties of India's urban middle class (Bhagat 2011).

II. Biography of Chetan Bhagat

Chetan Bhagat (born 22 April 1974, New Delhi, India) is a contemporary Indian author, columnist, and motivational speaker, widely recognized for his bestselling novels that capture the aspirations and dilemmas of India's urban middle class. Bhagat studied at the prestigious Indian Institute of Technology

(IIT) Delhi, earning a degree in Mechanical Engineering, and later completed his MBA at the Indian Institute of Management (IIM) Ahmedabad. Before venturing into full-time writing, he worked in investment banking and corporate consulting, experiences that later influenced his portrayal of professional and urban life in India.

Bhagat's literary career began with the publication of *Five Point Someone* (2004), which explored the pressures of academic life at elite Indian institutions. He gained massive popularity with subsequent novels, including *One Night @ the Call Center* (2005), *The 2 States* (2009), and *Revolution 2020* (2011), all of which blend humor, romance, and social commentary while highlighting the anxieties and ambitions of India's young urban middle class. Many of his works have been adapted into successful Bollywood films, making his stories widely accessible and culturally influential.

In addition to fiction, Bhagat writes columns for major Indian newspapers, addressing youth issues, education, career choices, and social change. He has received several accolades for his contribution to literature and popular culture and is regarded as one of India's most influential contemporary writers, particularly for making literature relatable to a broad, urban readership. His writing is often characterized by its simple, direct style, focus on contemporary middle-class life, and engagement with social realities.

III. Novels of Chetan Bhagat on Urban Alienation and Middle-Class Anxiety

Chetan Bhagat is a prominent contemporary Indian writer whose novels vividly portray the realities of urban life and the anxieties of the Indian middle class. His works focus on young people struggling with academic pressure, career uncertainty, family expectations, social mobility, corruption, and emotional isolation in a rapidly modernizing society. Through relatable characters and realistic narratives, Bhagat captures the aspirations and frustrations of contemporary India. His novel *Five Point Someone* examines the intense competition and stress faced by engineering students. *One Night @ the Call Center* explores workplace dissatisfaction and identity crises among urban professionals. *The 3 Mistakes of My Life* highlights entrepreneurial ambitions and personal struggles, while *2 States: The Story of My Marriage* addresses cultural conflicts and family expectations. *Revolution 2020* critiques corruption and educational inequality, and *Half Girlfriend* explores class differences, loneliness, and belonging. Additionally, *What Young India Wants* presents his reflections on the aspirations and concerns of India's youth. Together, these works provide valuable insights into urban alienation and middle-class anxiety in contemporary Indian society.

Five Point Someone (2004)

In *Five Point Someone* (2004), Chetan Bhagat explores the pressures and anxieties experienced by middle-class students in the elite urban environment of IIT Delhi. The novel focuses on Hari, Ryan, and Alok, three friends struggling to meet the high academic expectations imposed by the institution and their families. The relentless competition, strict grading systems, and emphasis on academic success generate significant stress, making the characters feel trapped between personal aspirations and societal obligations (Bhagat 35). This pressure exemplifies middle-class anxiety, as education is framed as the primary means of upward mobility, leaving little room for failure or deviation from prescribed norms (Sharma 78). Urban alienation is depicted through the emotional and psychological isolation the students experience, even while surrounded by peers; friendships offer temporary solace but cannot completely mitigate the tension of conforming to institutional and societal expectations. Bhagat's narrative emphasizes how the urban educational setting, while offering opportunities for social advancement, simultaneously creates a sense of estrangement, identity conflict, and emotional vulnerability among the urban middle-class youth (Bhagat 42). Through this portrayal, the novel illustrates the duality of urban spaces as both arenas of opportunity and sources of anxiety and alienation for young aspirants.

Bhagat portrays the constant monitoring, performance targets, and monotonous routines as sources of stress, anxiety, and emotional detachment, reflecting the challenges of urban professional life (Bhagat 28). The middle-class aspiration for economic stability, career growth, and social recognition heightens the characters' anxiety, as failure or underperformance is perceived as personal and familial disappointment (Sharma 82). Urban alienation is depicted through the isolation the characters experience despite working in close proximity, highlighting emotional disconnection, lack of meaningful interpersonal bonds, and the impersonality of corporate spaces. Bhagat also emphasizes how technology, globalization, and corporate hierarchies intensify the sense of estrangement, creating an environment where professional obligations often overshadow personal desires and well-being (Bhagat 45). Through this narrative, the novel critiques the urban middle-class pursuit of success while illustrating the psychological and emotional costs of modern corporate life.

Shyam: Shyam is the protagonist and emotional center of the novel. He is ambitious yet uncertain, representing the urban middle-class youth caught between professional aspirations and personal limitations. Shyam experiences self-doubt and anxiety due to the monotony of call center work and the pressure to fulfil family expectations.
